Welcome to this South West CCAC Bulletin designed for our partners in primary care

What does the South West Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) do?

- We work alongside primary care to help people navigate the health system.
- We connect people with home care and community services, supporting more than 60,000 clients each year.
- With case managers in every hospital and connected with every physician, community agency, long-term care home and school, we help smooth transitions, such as hospital to home, and home to long-term care.
- We connect orphan patients to family doctors, with more than 12,000 patients matched so far. Go to www.health.gov.on.ca/en/ms/ healthcareconnect/public/ for information.
- As a result of the Partnerships for Health initiative, we work on-site with 74 family physicians to review common patients and put community supports in place.
- We measure and track quality outcomes and report on them publicly.

What can we do for you and your patients?

When your patients need help to get better or manage safely at home, the CCAC is there. CCAC case managers are health professionals who will assess your patient's needs, arrange for home care (if necessary) and connect them with community services such as Meals on Wheels, Diabetes Education Programs and Adult Day Programs. If the time comes, we support patients to make the move to long-term care or other housing options. Concerned about a patient recently discharged from hospital? We can help with that too.

FlexClinics Expanded

- FlexClinics are CCAC clinics staffed by Registered Nurses set up in a variety of community settings across the South West.
- Most CCAC patients who are ambulatory and not immuno-suppressed or medically fragile will be referred to the nearest FlexClinic for nursing care.

FlexClinics offer several benefits:

- Patients have appointments that fit their schedules and don't have to wait at home for the nurse to arrive.
- Getting to appointments encourages patients to be active, an important part of the healing process.
- Clinics are located within easy traveling distance for any patient.
- Nurses see more patients in a day, increasing the CCAC's capacity.

Home First Update

- Home First is an approach to care based on the idea that when a person enters hospital, everyone works together to get him or her home upon discharge.
- For people with high needs, a
 program of intensive services
 (up to 24/7 when necessary,
 including Nurse Practitioners)
 provided temporarily while clients
 settle in at home.
- The approach and new services are reducing ALCs, improving client outcomes and savings thousands of hospital days each year.
- Currently in London and St.
